

Brothers, Sisters, and Friends,

I'm honored to be your Grand Chancellor; I'm looking forward to another great year. We've started scheduling for the official visits, so if you haven't heard from your District Deputy about scheduling a visit please give him a call. I should have 3-5 Grand Lodge officers attending each visit. We all look forward to the visits, meeting the members and learning about you and your lodge activities.

I did a lot of research while I was the Grand Vice Chancellor for a project that would be a benefit to the communities and at the same time give the lodges and Knights of Pythias some name recognition. This project needed to be something that all of the lodges could participate in. The monies they donate towards the project would be returned to them in the form of a product they could donate to an organization of their choice. I believe the project I have found will meet those criteria. The project I have found is the purchase and distribution of Automated External Defibrillators (AED) to public or private organizations such as schools, aquatic centers, police departments, sporting leagues, senior centers, or any organization that could be in the need of an AED. An Automated External Defibrillator (AED) would be a welcomed donation to any of the mentioned organizations.

In researching this project, I found that Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is one of the leading causes of death among adults in North America. SCA can happen anywhere to anyone, at any time without warning, without symptoms, and regardless of age or general health. People who suffer SCA usually do not know in advance that they are vulnerable to this fatal condition. This project will have a positive impact on the survival rates for individuals suffering from Sudden Cardiac Arrest. I'm convinced that this project will save lives and am pleased to have learned of the need and be able to dedicate resources to its completion.

As the cost of the AED's are

about \$1,200 each, I have found a number of charitable foundations that may donate to this project. I have sent out proposal letters and am waiting for a response back.

The materials for the Poster Contest were handed out at Grand Lodge. This will give the schools and students more time to plan and develop their posters. If your lodge hasn't appointed a poster chairman, now is the time so the materials can be delivered to the schools. The Knights of Pythias Poster Contest entitled "**BE A FRIEND WHEN IT COUNTS**" is open to any student enrolled as a Freshman (Grade 9), Sophomore (Grade 10), Junior (Grade 11), or Senior (Grade 12) in any Junior or Senior High or Parochial School in the United States and Canada. The rules have changed. Now it's acceptable to use any two dimensional medium (computer graphics, photography, stenciling, drawing, painting etc.) We may have some really interesting entries this year.

BC's Gladys Wirsch, PSR Shares Pier 21 Story

I was asked to give my reasons for going to the Supreme Sessions in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and revisiting Pier 21. This is my story.

I was born March 12, 1921 to my parents Ernest Pharoh Kirby and Olive Maude Howard in Hull on the River Humber on the north east coast of Yorkshire, England. We were a family of four after the arrival of my brother Ernest Howard, two years later.

Life was fairly normal until

the third of September 1939. I was 18 years old and instantly drafted to a factory a few miles out of my hometown making ammunition parts. Close to the small town of Beverly was an airport where a lot of young men were stationed, Australians, Canadians and British.

In August 1941 I met George Long, a young Canadian pilot and we fell in love. Just three months later we married. I always felt

like "Second Hand Rose" because my dress, headdress, veil and shoes were borrowed. We did not have enough clothing coupons to buy new things.

In 1943 we had a baby boy, George Thomas and were very happy under the circumstances. Our journey to Canada was to be on October 4, 1944 and my husband, "now a Flight Lieutenant" was given leave to come and help me pack. On his way down I had word that our sailing had been cancelled because of the activity in the Atlantic Ocean and North Sea.

I did have a very strange feeling when it was time to say goodbye at the railroad station and asked my husband to take me back to Scotland, but that was impossible. Ironically on the day I was to have left, my husband was killed and I became a young widow at 23. I asked for another sailing date because I had made a promise to bring our son to see his grandparents in Canada.

At midnight on February 4, 1945 we sailed from Prestwick, Scotland on H.M.S. The Aquitania with war brides, injured servicemen, and like me, war widows. The crossing was not very inspiring. Rough seas and zigzags every 8 minutes did not make it a pleasant crossing. Ten women and three babies in five double tier bunk beds in one small cabin was not very

pleasurable. However, after a very stormy crossing we landed at Pier 21, Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada on February 14, 1945.

I do not remember very much of the landing as I was mourning my husband's passing. Going back to Pier 21 this year gave me very mixed emotions. After all I am now 85 years of age, not the scared 23 year young widow that had left family and friends to come to a new country to meet my in-laws who I only knew from snap shots and censored letters.

I arrived in Trail, British Columbia on February 19, 1945 and this has been my home for 61 years. I was given another chance of happiness when after almost six years I met and married Edwin Wirsch and had two sons, Larry and Howard and my daughter Joy. In 1993 Edwin passed away and after 43 years I was alone again. I now have two beautiful granddaughters and one grandson and a new great grandson whom I love unconditionally.

I have so many memories, some very happy, some not so, but looking back I feel that Canada has been good to me. It was a safe haven from the War II and I am a true Canadian.

I joined the Order of Pythian

Sisters in November 1945 and was Grand Chief of British Columbia in 1987-88 and now am a Past Supreme Representative.




The trustees of Damon Lodge repaired the parking area and tore out and replaced the bad sidewalk leading to the lodge hall.
