Then the next step has to be a calling committee to ask people to attend. We are all busy so giving some people a part to play increases the odds that they will say yes to your invitation.

It all boils down to effort. If you are willing to work to develop your organization it will pay off. If you are unwilling to put in the time guess what? Sometimes all that is needed is a spark plug, a person who will give things a push and create a direction to follow. We have all heard it said that "if you are not a part of the solution, you may be a part of the problem". My hope is that you will spring into action and help your lodge by <u>Growing the Order through</u> Membership Involvement

The tour started on May 21st at Gaston Lodge for a 1:00pm meeting of the Grand Council. The council heard reports by the Scholarship committee, the Pythian Fun Day Committee, the OPN report the Web and communications committee, the lodge support and the report of the Prelate and

Grand Lodge planning committees.

It was pointed out that the method of communications between members, Lodges and our state organization is moving steadily toward more internets and less on telephone and letters. This leaves us in a house divided as half of our members are online but many are not. We must keep a strong OPN to help us bridge the gap and keep all informed.
