



John Lacy Donates Platelets in Memory of Mom ~ American Red Cross

John Lacy proudly displays his 17-gallon pin and 19-special event pins on his American Red Cross lanyard. He began donating blood in high school and in 1999 he learned about apheresis and has been donating platelets since. Within his first three platelet donations he was selected as a designated donor to a Pacific Northwest Patient.

“I like knowing I’m helping others, it makes feel warm and fuzzy,” John cites as one of many reasons for donating. “It feels like family when I come in to donate, I especially enjoy nurses Lynn Sivalvai and Kathi Reynolds.” In addition, John’s mom, Viona, suffered a reoccurrence of breast cancer after 30 years and required many units of platelets during the course of her treatment. Unfortunately, she eventually succumbed to the cancer. John honors her memory on her birthday each year, with a platelet donation. It is a comfort to know it may help another family battling illness like cancer.

As a committed donor, John has developed a sophisticated donation tracking system on his computer. He consistently donates the maximum of 24 donations per year. When he reaches the maximum, it’s very difficult to sit on the sidelines until he’s eligible again. When John donates, he watches reruns of Perry


Each year, it is not uncommon for Esther to make 30 or more comforters and quilts for various service organizations, as well as at least 70 knitted caps for children of all ages.

Grand Chancellor's Corner


Dear Knights, Sisters and Friends:



Glencoe Lodge Supports the Perpetual Hall of Knowledge

On November 10, 2004 the Knights of Glencoe Lodge No. 22 were presented with an opportunity to provide financial support for a New Library in North Plains. The Friends of the North Plains Library are leading a community-wide effort to



raise approximately \$875,000 to construct a new library and provide operational funding. The ultimate goal of the group is to seek inclusion of the library into the Washington County Cooperative Library System to provide a permanent library facility in the community.

The North Plains Library is currently operating out of a tiny 590 square foot room in the local Jessie Mays Community Center in North Plains. The library has grown since its start-up in 2003 with a collection of over 5,000 items, an excellent selection of Spanish-language large print talking books, two computers with Internet access and, the library's entire shelf catalogue being searchable on the World Wide Web. The library also recently opened a "branch" location at a senior living center, providing first-time Internet access to many low-income seniors.


Glencoe Lodge No. 22 has expressed interest with the prospect of providing support to The Friends of the North Plains Public Library effort to build and operate a new 2500 square foot library facility. Nearly two-thirds of the project cost has already been secured through the local community to build the new facility. The Knights of Glencoe Lodge No. 22 decided that this is a viable community project worthy of financial support, benefiting a significant proportion of low-income individuals, families and youth in the community.

In a subsequent business meeting, the matter was sent to the Lodge Finance Committee for recommendation for inclusion into the operating budget. This was approved by the Finance Committee and sent to the Lodge for a vote by the

membership. Glencoe Lodge No. 22 voted unanimously to support The Friends of the North Plains Library with a pledge of \$5,000 of financial support for operational funding over a three year period, beginning year 2005 through 2007. Glencoe Lodge No. 22 is seeking matching funds for each year of the pledge from the Foundation Fund established by Grand Lodge for these important local projects.

Construction of the New North Plains Library is slated for spring of 2005 with doors opening in the fall of 2005. The funding provided by Glencoe Lodge No. 22 will assist the library in sustaining the New Library at a level that will allow its inclusion into the Washington County Cooperative Library System in 2007. When criteria is met by the New Library and the library joins the Cooperative Library System in 2007, permanent operational funding will then be available, making this effort a win-win for the community and for Glencoe Lodge.

As a result of the level of financial support pledged by Glencoe Lodge No. 22, the Knights will receive recognition in the Literary Circle with the lodge name on the Literary Circle Donor Wall in the New Library. In addition, the Knights will also receive an invitation to the New Building Pre-Opening



Event, recognition in the New Building Grand Opening Publication, special invitation to the Annual Literary Circle Event and first choice of materials at all book sales during preview hours. Perhaps, the most important benefit to the Knights will be the perpetual hall of knowledge, a resource center sure to benefit the youth in our community and for generations to come.


Ivanhoe Lodge Installs Officers

The photo at the bottom left on page 16 has two identical dolphins in it. It was used in a case study on stress level at St. Mary's Hospital. Look at the dolphins jumping out of the water/ The dolphins are identical. A closely monitored, scientific study of a group revealed that in spite of the fact that the dolphins are identical, a person under stress would find

differences in the two dolphins. If there are many differences found between both dolphins, it means that the person is experiencing a great amount of stress. Look at the photograph and if you find more than one or two differences you may want to take a vacation.

Relay for Life ~ Altruistic Project with Big Rewards!

Grand Chancellor Charlie VanDomelen supports volunteer participation at ACS' Relay for Life fundraisers. As a Hillsboro Pythian, he recognizes that this is a very rewarding venture as several of our Pythian members have learned firsthand.

Relay for Life began in 1985 when Dr. Gordy Klatt, a colorectal surgeon and avid runner took the first step of his 24-hour walk/run around a track in Tacoma, Washington. He clocked 83 miles, raising \$27,000 to support the American Cancer Society. The following year, 220 supporters on 19 teams joined Dr. Klatt in this overnight event, and the ACS Relay for Life was born. Over the last 19 years, Relay for Life has spread to 4,200 communities in the United States and eight foreign countries. What began as one man's statement in the fight against cancer has led to the development of a worldwide event to help banish cancer.

Today, Relay for Life is ACS's largest event. Relay offers something for everyone, from the newly diagnosed, to caregivers and friends, to long-term survivors. Most people participate by getting pledges and walk as part of a team who walk, relay style, for 24 hours to raise awareness of the problem of cancer and to raise funds for cancer research. These events are usually held on weekends to gather the most support.

Several members of the Hillsboro Pythians have been involved with Relay for Life for 3 years. We have found that with as few as 5 or 6 people volunteering at a Relay for Life event, we can make a difference and show others in our community the value of being a Pythian. Each year we go to Relays wearing our bright orange vests and help with registration and preparation of the luminaria. (Luminaria are decorated paper bags weighted with sand to hold candles, which are lit at sunset.) Most of us who participate do so for personal reasons, having lost a family member or friend to cancer. We find that participation in this event is an emotional time where we find others who share in our experience, a time and place where we can come together to

do something positive to "make a difference" in this fight against cancer.

There are several ways in which you can participate – most of which don't involve much, if any, cost to the volunteers. Here are some examples:

- take pledges and walk as part of a relay team (registration fee applies)
- help with registration and distribution of supplies
- help prepare the luminaria (candle bags) and distribute them around the track or in the grandstands
- donate funds and decorate your own luminaria bag in honor or memory of someone.

WHAT IS APHERESIS?

Apheresis is a procedure in which a specific component, most often platelets, is collected. Platelets are essential for blood clotting and are produced in the bone marrow of healthy people. Platelets are only usable for five days, so the supply must be constantly replenished. Each day, local patients who undergo chemotherapy, bone marrow transplants or open-heart surgery depend on platelets to prevent severe bleeding throughout the course of their treatments. Depending on patient needs, the apheresis process may also include collection of plasma.

WHO NEEDS PLATELETS?

Your platelet donation can help patients with the following conditions:

- **Cancer patients** (especially those with leukemia) who require chemotherapy, which often renders the body unable to produce platelets
- **Surgical patients** who require platelets to help the blood clot and prevent severe bleeding
- **Patients with blood disorders** such as aplastic anemia

HOW ARE PLATELETS COLLECT DURING APHRESEIS?

During apheresis, whole blood from the donor is passed through sterile tubing into a cell separator, where platelets are collected. The remaining portion of the blood is returned to the donor. No more than one pint of blood is processed at one time.

WHO CAN DONATE PLATELETS?

Any person in good health who:

- Can devote approximately two hours for a donations
- Weighs at least 110 pounds
- Is 17 years of age or 16 years with parental consent
