

The logo of the Fraternal Order Knights of Pythias contains the letters F, C and B in recognition of the guiding principles of our Fraternal Order.

denotes the principle of **Friendship** of the bond between men of good faith and confidence in others for community services.

C denotes the principle of Charity, the forgiveness of errors and shortcomings of others

**B** denotes the principle **Benevolence**, the support of others and community in our daily lives and activities.



The logo of the Pythian Sisters organization contains the letters P, L, E and F. They represent the four guiding principles of the Organization.

Prepresents the principle of **Purity.** It is our highest quality and comes from Heaven and the spiritual world.

represents the principle of **Love**. It is the strongest of the emotions and the basis of all virtues. Love diminishes anger, hatred, resentment, injustice and oppression. Under its influence, we express sympathetic kindness to others.

represents the principle of **Equality**, the guardian of human rights. It influences how we treat others and all that we do. Treating others as we would like to be treated, as equals, promotes harmony.



#### **Grand Lodge of Oregon Instituted November 8, 1881**

The Grand Chancellor has asked me to be the Grand Historian, and to that end, I have appropriated a copy of <u>Pythian History</u> by William Kennedy. The following is an excerpt from the book concerning the Grand Lodge of Oregon.

On November 8, 1881, the Grand Lodge was instituted – There were then but 9 lodges with 419 members in Oregon. By the end of 1882, 5 Lodges had been added, with 776 members. Nine more Lodges came in 1883 and the membership doubled. By that time, to a certain extent, expansion had been pressed to the limit, and most of the places where success might reasonably be assured, were occupied. Then, it stood still until 1890, when it rose to 32

Lodges, with 1,901 members. During the next year, 15 Lodges were added and the roster of membership increased to 2,753, rising in 1894 to 3,317, when, for 4 years it remained stationary. Again, it moved forward steadily,

until, at the end of 1902, it had 76 Lodges with a membership of 4,963. But these results were not attained by sitting still – they were the footings that told of earnest, hard work and conscientious labor by at least several of the Pythian executives in that Domain, who gave freely of their time and means to the up-building of the Order and laying broad and deep its foundations. It meant work and intelligent effort – work of which those in the more populous and favored Domains know but little.

This excerpt from Pythian History – Oregon published in 1904 shows how we had dramatic growth in this Domain at the start of our history; Growth that even astonished those in more populous areas of the Supreme Domain. We should be proud of the work done by our ancestors, but even more we should be thinking that we could do just as well as them. Wouldn't it be wonderful again to have 76 Lodges and 5,000 members? Why are we so selfish to keep this Order to ourselves and not invite others to partake of the wonderful friendships found within?



Without their help the program would have had to fold and the kids wouldn't have been able to participate and no longer be eligible for the \$14 million in scholarships FIRST is offering to participants. For most of the kids on this team this is their only hope of getting to go to college. The Knights have also graciously made their kitchen available for the team to use which has been very advantageous for the team as they feed the students at every meeting and a kitchen has been a God send to keep the cost of feeding the team down. 75% of the students on this team are on Free or Reduced lunch program so meals are absolutely necessary.

Despite their own troubles, FRC Team 1432 has been helping the Salvation Army of Gresham, Oregon to start a brand new FRC team. After Kick Off the new team came back to the Ivanhoe Lodge to brainstorm about this year's competition. They are also seeing interest from local youth living around the lodge so even more students in need will have an opportunity to participate in this very beneficial program.




## Eagle Scout Clark Huey Recognized by Phoenix Lodge
