

We had a very fun and enjoyable time at the Hillsboro Relay for Life fundraiser. Relay for Life represents the hope that those who we lost to cancer will never be forgotten, that those who face cancer will be supported, and that one-day cancer will be eliminated.

The relay was held June 25 and 26 from 10:00 am Saturday to 10:00 am Sunday at the Hillsboro Stadium. The relay's goal was \$35,000. The relay actually made over \$48,000. The Pythian team raised \$838. There were 34 teams at the relay this year. Each team had at least 8 people to participate. The Pythian team consisted of John Lacy, Darrell Henry, Charlie VanDomelen, Don Lacy, Shelley and Chi Corby, Phil, Maureen, Aaron, Sarah, Andrew and James Murphy. The team campsites were located all around the track except for in the front where they had a stage. Each team had someone on the track at all times for 24 hours.

The theme for the Relay for Life was "Let's knock cancer out of the park". Our team's name was "Momma's Angels in the

Outfield". We picked that name partly in memory of "Viona Lacy." Viona (Momma) claimed many adoptive daughters and sons. Viona had kind words and encouragement for anyone she knew. She had a hug for everyone. Viona was a great Mom and friend. We all miss her very much.

The Relay for Life first had the survivors walk around the track for one lap. After that, as they called team names, the members of that team would join the survivors on the track. When they called out for the Hillsboro Pythian team John, Shelley and Chi came out on the track. We all took turns walking around the track, usually in pairs because it was more fun that way. Walking around the track at night was really pretty with all of the luminarias lit all the way around the track. There were so many luminarias that in some places they were double one row behind the other. Also in the grandstand they had the words CURE and HOPE lit in luminarias.

The scholarship recipients for the 2005-2006 school year are as follows:





Ivanhoe Lodge Celebrates 100 Years

Some time ago, after Ivanhoe Lodge had moved from its downtown location, I examined the charter of the lodge. It said



that the institution date for the lodge was July 25, 1905. I initially wanted a very big party to celebrate, with a banquet and dancing and speeches and all the ritual an event like this deserves.


However, as the years dragged on, our membership got less and less active and I had to give up on those ideas, but not on the idea of a celebration. So, on July 23, 2005, Ivanhoe Lodge had a small open house celebration for its centennial.

Ivanhoe Lodge had initially been instituted as Ivanhoe Lodge #10 on Jan. 4, 1882. However, the consolidation with Oregon No. 1 and Orpheus No. 59 made its new date of institution July 25, 1905.

The members, during the meetings this year, had considered a banquet or reception at a downtown Portland hotel, or a

reception at the lodge hall. Our finances, finally, determined that a reception, or open house type party would be the best. We discussed what should be available at the party and decided that finger foods, punch and a cake would be satisfactory. An ad was placed in the *Oregon Pythian News* and then we waited.

The date of Saturday, July 23, 2005 came and our Secretary, Al Meska was ready. Without much fanfare, he made the finger foods, the punch and purchased a cake. A small crowd came and went during the three hours of the open house and I will be eternally grateful to those who took time from their day to attend. I will not list them here, they know who they are.



The North Plains Garlic Festival is the largest community activity that the Glencoe Knights participate in. The Garlic Festival also accounts for our single largest source of fundraising revenue during the year. Through our operating agreement with the North Plains Chamber of Commerce, Glencoe Lodge splits the profits after expenses of operation with the Chamber of Commerce. The Knights of Glencoe Lodge, like the Chamber, set aside the funds to be redistributed back into worthwhile community projects and programs. A special committee is appointed each year by Glencoe Lodge and charged with organizing, coordinating and oversight of the beer garden operation.

Glencoe Lodge is dependent on its membership to pull off this event. In addition to the duties performed by the appointed committee, many of our members provide valuable time during the event with tasks of handling money, guarding gates, serving patrons, checking identification, monitoring, cleaning, general policing of the beer garden, tabulating results and managing expenses. The Garlic Festival Beer Garden is a high profile event for the Glencoe Knights; it provides a great source of funds, connection with our community and recognition for our Order.






If My Body Were a Car



Who Are the Timber Beasts?

The Timber Beasts BB Gun Shooting Team is a group of eight to fifteen year olds, both boys and girls, sponsored by the Knight of Pythias of Forest Grove and Gaston, Knights of Pythias Foundation Fund, and have also been supported by the Knights of Pythias in Eugene and The Dalles.

This team is brought together to learn discipline, patience, self-control and responsibility that come from mastering the sport of shooting. To accomplish this, the team is instructed on safe and responsible handling of firearms, primarily BB Guns, for a 12-week period, practicing one night a week. Scores are tallied and recorded for averages and personal bests in four positions: Standing, Kneeling, Sitting and Prone, in addition to taking a written test each week.

Five to seven shooters scoring the highest averages attend the Oregon State BB Gun Match. Placing first at this match as a team earns the group the privilege to represent the State of Oregon at the Daisy/US Jaycee International BB Gun Match. The match this year was held in Bowling Green, Kentucky on July 2-3.

Our team from Forest Grove was represented by Jake Adams, Jacob Bristow, Holley Brandt, Travis Peters, Dakota Spreng, Cody Brown and Jacob Strother. The coaching staff was Howard Baker, Kelli Dow and Ron Brandt. The team began the competition with the prone and standing position on Saturday morning, followed by the written 50-question test in the early afternoon. Scores were posted late afternoon on Saturday and the Timber Beasts were currently ranked 6th out of 36 teams in the prone position, 2nd in the standing position (this being quite an accomplishment in itself) and placing 12th after the written test scores were added. The tally of these three scores secured a position in the top 10 ranking overall for the team. Sunday's competition began with the sitting position and finished with the kneeling position around noon. Unofficially, at the end of the competition, the Timber Beasts were 2 points ahead of the other 35 teams. Due to a delay in posting scores for kneeling, the team had to wait until closing ceremonies for the final results.

After the closing ceremonies on Sunday evening, the Timber Beasts had a final score of 2,349 out of a possible 2,500, tying with a team from South Dakota for First Place. Since there are no ties in the competition, the tiebreaker is determined by center shots (bulls-eyes). South Dakota's team had 16 more center shots than our Oregon Timber Beasts team, finishing second overall. This is the best finish in the 24-plus years of our team participating in the Daisy/US Jaycee International BB Gun Championship Match.

Pythians Help Tucker-Maxon Oral School

Community service is, and rightly should be, a huge part of the life of a Pythian. However, with the changes that have taken place over the years, finding a worthwhile project that is manageable for our group can truly be a challenge. With this in mind, you can imagine how glad I was to have an opportunity to really make a difference in the life of others just fall into my lap!

Shortly before the end of the school year I received a phone call from my 5-year old granddaughter asking if I would help her raise money for new playground equipment for her school. Emily attends Tucker-Maxon Oral School in Portland. This previously was a school for the deaf but now is a fully accredited private school. After asking many questions about the new playground equipment they wanted to purchase, I discovered that they did indeed have a rather unique problem which needed correcting as soon as possible.

With all the advances made in the ability to treat hearing loss, a great number of the students have cochlear implants. These are electronic devices that are implanted in the head to enable hearing. Unfortunately, their playground structure was made with plastic parts and the static electricity sometimes produced was enough to damage the implants. This put the equipment off limits to those with the implants. It was a very difficult situation at best.

As soon as I told Grandpa Jerry what Emily had called about, his reaction was the same as mine had been. We decided to see what we could do to help out with this project. We were still discussing this situation as we arrived at a Hillsboro Pythian meeting shortly after the phone call. Discussing the situation with those members present prior to our meeting, we had the interest of many others. By the end of the meeting several groups had pledged their support to help this project both financially and by volunteering their time to help assem-

ble the play structure once it was purchased. Word of mouth can be a wonderful thing. People were talking about Tucker-Maxon and their situation with the playground equipment and before long we were receiving phone calls from other parts of the state. People wanted to help with the funding. This was terrific!

Shortly, as this needed to be done before the end of the school year, funds were coming in from all over. With the help of Ivanhoe Lodge, Phoenix Lodge, Rose Temple, Talisman Lodge, Helmet Lodge, and some matching funds from the Knights Foundation adding to the

donation Jerry and I made, we were able to present Tucker-Maxon with a check in the amount of \$2100.00. While this did not fund the structure completely, it certainly made a huge difference in the amount left to be raised.

Darrell Henry, Charlie VanDomelen, Mark Erickson, and Cameran Heckenlaible joined Jerry and I for the presentation. Upon arriving at Tucker-Maxon, we discovered that we were to be making our presentation, on behalf of the Pythians, at an outdoor assembly near the old play structure with the younger

students present. Emily was allowed to be “on stage” with us for the presentation as she was our key to the project. George, the Principal, gave a very nice presentation regarding details of who we are, the principles of our order, and why we were there. The children responded to our mission with great enthusiasm rewarding us with clapping and cheering. Afterward the children returned to their classes and we took pictures of the “before” situation. I am sure everyone left feeling a good thing was being done.

There was also another project that came about as a result of this. Cameran, a member of the Boy Scout troop sponsored by Phoenix Lodge, is currently working toward his Eagle Scout Rank and needed a project. He accompanied us to Tucker-Maxon for the presentation and found his project. There was an old boat at the back of the school property that he was able

Drug/Medicine Impaired Driving

We all are familiar with the dangers of alcohol impaired driving, but what about drug impaired driving?

In general, impairment can be defined as changes in the person's ability of perform routine daily tasks at the normal level of functioning. Symptoms may include drowsiness or excitability, altered depth perception, or slowed or increased reaction time. The effects of impairment vary from person to person. In general, impairment effects your ability to drive, but these changes can be difficult to identify. You could be drug impaired and not even know it.



Driving while impaired is a leading cause of car accidents. But alcohol and illegal drugs are not the only contributing substances. Many common over-the-counter medications can cause impairment. Antihistamines and some cough and cold remedies may affect driving skills by inducing drowsiness or excitability, or by altering reaction times (pseudoephedrine, any one?). Another affect is altered depth perception.

To avoid driving while impaired by medications:

- Consult your physician or pharmacist to learn the side effects of medications.
- Read the directions and warning labels of any medications you are taking.

- Ask your physician about alternative non-impairing medications.
- Follow the directions for dosage and never take more than the recommended dose.
- Never mix medications without first checking with your physicist or pharmacist.
- Never mix alcohol with your medications. Alcohol can enhance their impairment effects.
- Familiarize yourself with the signs and symptoms of drug impairment before you get behind the wheel.

A driver can be convicted of driving under the influence by having drugs that cause impairment in his/her system even though no alcohol is present. Don't risk being involved in an accident or being convicted of driving while impaired.

If you are taking medications that cause impairment, don't drive. Have a relative or friend drive for you.

The risk of an accident, the maiming or killing of self or an innocent is just not worth it!

Oregon Garden Reorganization Update



Dear Friends:

August 2005

I am writing to tell you that, effective September 1, Marion County will take over management of operations of The Oregon Garden. The County is working with the City of Silverton, Chemeketa Community College and the developer of the proposed Oregon Garden Inn on developing a plan to solve financial difficulties The Garden has encountered, and to keep The Garden open to the public.

All partners realize the importance of maintaining a good solid relationship with members, donors and volunteers who have understood what The Garden is contributing to the quality of life in the Willamette Valley and to environmental education.

Many of the programs that have prospered during the past five years will continue, including the Fifth Grade Education Program sponsored by the Roth Family Education Foundation, and the Rediscovery Forest Education Programs sponsored by the Oregon Forest Resources Institute. Also, the Gordon House designed by Frank Lloyd Wright will continue to be open, as a separate museum, for visitors and events.

All details of the new management structure and programming have not yet been defined, but the intent is to continue the many projects and special events that have drawn widespread interest and support.

In light of the management change, the existing staff is being laid off, effective August 31. This has become necessary because The Oregon Garden Foundation does not have sufficient funds to cover staff salaries beyond that date. We are disappointed that declining admissions has brought this about, but we can say with confidence that we believe Marion County is exploring sound solutions that will enable The Garden to survive and thrive.

You will hear from the new management after September 1. We will try to post news on The Oregon Garden website that will keep you up to date on developments. The Garden will continue to be open through October; plans for the winter will be announced after the first of September.

We hope you will continue to enjoy The Garden during every season. Thank you for your interest and support.


Dear Oregon Pythians and Friends ~
