


Grand Temple 2011 will be held in Newport Oregon on October 14-16.

# **Words from Grand Secretary Mike**

### **Fellow Pythians:**

### **Brothers and Sisters,**

I found this list and thought I would share it, it's called Seven Cyber Mistakes Not to Make:

- Never let yourself get phished or scammed, a financial institution would never ask you for your password. Never use their supplied email reply link.
- Exchanging personal pictures and information on line. Do not communicate with strangers even if it is a so called friend of a friend.
- 3. Open e-greetings without thinking. Always make sure you know who sent it and email them separately to verify they sent it.
- Clicking links in mystery e-mails. Anything questionable in the message should be a flag to delete it completely.
- 5. Clicking buttons before you think. This scam uses the yes and no or quit and continue buttons but what they do is rearrange them so any button does what they want. Use the red X in the top right to delete.
- Downloading free internet applications. Do not download without knowing the source.
   There are free ones out there but just as

- many scammers. Check the cookies and delete unfamiliar ones.
- Keep your password safe. Use strong passwords and change them regularly. A good way is to think of them as phrases with letters and numbers, that is the best way to have an original password.

I will send you two copies this year, one that you filled out for last year and the blank for this year. If you want to do this by email then just let me know.

# Three Oregon Past Grand Chiefs Celebrate Happy 90th Birthdays!!

In 1920 three baby girls were born. One in Oregon, one in Nebraska and one in Kansas. By 1945 they were all living in Oregon. In 1939, Pauline Terry, the native Oregonian joined Orionette Temple #31 in Elgin.

In 1949 Rosenna Powell, born in Nebraska joined Fern Temple #46 in Yamhill. In 1953 Fay Robinson, born in Kansas joined Phoenicia Temple #10 in Hillsboro.

These women were very active in their Temples, then joined Grand Tempe extending their work in Pythianism.

Fay Robinson was elected Grand Treasurer in 1970. After serving 5 years she received her past Grand Chief rating in 1975. She served as Supreme Representative in 1982.

Pauline Terry was elected Grand Guard in 1983. After serving in that office years, she went up the line of officers and served as Grand Chief in 1989. Then was Supreme Representative in 1996.

Rosenna Powell was recruited to serve as Grand Senior in 1998 and was Grand Chief in 1999.

The three Sisters were in attendance at the 2010 Grand Temple sessions. Their 90th birthdays, Fay on August 24th, Pauline on October 10, and Rosenna October 31st were celebrated at the convention.

In combining their membership years, over 180 years of Pythianism is represented.

# **Notes from Grand Lodge / Temple Fun Tours**

Grand Chancellor Bill Peal arranged a most interesting tour for Friday, October 15. A large gathering of Sisters set out for the Pendleton Woolen Mills chauffeured by a very brave Ben Anderson, Secretary of Damon Lodge #4. The Woolen Mills gift shop was full of beautiful blankets, clothing and trinkets. Our tour guide, Jenny, escorted us through the working factory. Headphones were provided to raise her voice above the noisy machinery. She explained the processes of washing, carding, dying, and weaving of the wool. The building was constructed in 1909 and the original huge wooded posts and ceiling still stand. One of the owners, C. M. "Mort" Bishop Jr. (1925-2007) was honored in 1991 by receiving a pipe tomahawk as a friendship award from the Confederated Tribes. The Indian name bestowed on Mr. Bishop was "Just Right Doer of Things".

We could have spent all day at the Woolen Mills, but we were off to the world famous cowboy outfitters, Hamley's established in 1883. One side of Hamley's sells saddles, tack and such. The other side is a fancy steakhouse restaurant and lounge. They used to make harnesses and belts (30,000 belts a month to sell back East) upstairs, and saddles and luggage downstairs. Co-owner Parley Pearce escorted us through the two buildings that have now been joined and magnificently restored upstairs, and make you think it is 1885 all over again. For a minute I thought I saw Doc Holliday coming around the corner. The

103-year old elevator is still operational and we used it. There are two huge rooms, one formerly a ballroom and the Elks Lodge, purchased by the Elks in 1909 for \$2,500, and one room that was a gentlemen's club for smoking cigars. The rooms are now used for wedding receptions and private parties. The massive ballroom bar was built in 1890 in Butte, Montana and purchased by Mr. Parley in 2004 for \$60,000. Two long walls in the gentlemen's club room are lined by a huge apothecary built in 1890 Berlin, Germany. It was purchased in 2006 by the Hamley's owners and shipped in sections to the new location. The sculptured tin tiles for the new ceilings were manufactured by a company still in business since before the Civil War. According to Mr. Pearce, people come from miles around just to see the X-rated artwork in the upstairs restrooms. We just took a quick peek. Too bad if you missed it.

Thank you to Ben for getting us back to the Red

Lion Hotel in time for the next scheduled event. Thank you Bill, and your committee of Knights for arranging such a good time for us. It was great.






# Oregon Pythian Sisters' Service Adds Up

If you ask any Pythian Sister they can tell you that they have a longstanding custom of keeping track of the altruistic work that they do. In addition to recording what the Temples donate, they record the individual members' contributions too. At each meeting they pass around a notebook or clipboard where each Sister writes down the service she has provided since the last meeting.

It's amazing how much benefit our communities gain from the service of our members. The altruistic work numbers are added up by our Secretaries — first at the Subordinate Temple level, then at the Grand level and every 2 years for all of the States and Provinces together at the Supreme level.

The chart to the right shows the altruistic work of Oregon's Sisters for the two year term 2008-2009. Most Pythians take for granted the amount of service work that we perform in our communities. It's just in our nature to help others. However if we look at it from the perspective of the recipients of our good work, this 2-year period offers 22,170 acts of kindness, 1,930 hours of service and \$41,557 in monetary contributions to benefit others. All this from a state with a relatively small membership base.



# Friendship Campground 2010

If you are in the need for a good snowball fight this winter, the Meacham Friendship campground is ready to go. Thanks to many hearty souls, good attitudes, and chainsaws.

On November 6<sup>th</sup> the lodge had its annual fall burning and thinning day up at our Meacham property. It was a great success. Legally we must wait till fire season is over before we burn the slash/thinning piles. We prefer to have a bit of snow on the ground or falling the day of the burning. This year the weather was ideal. It snowed earlier that week. The piles were covered for the summer and fall, and were dry inside. The weather on the 6<sup>th</sup> was mild and not raining or snowing. This prompted a great response from the lodge members and their families to play in the woods for a day.

There were 16-18 different people who showed up to help that day. Jim Aldrich started it off by showing up early. When I arrived he had 3 piles he was feeding and had all one guy could do. Within the hour we had 10 people working, 6 piles burning and being fed, firewood being cut and poles being hauled to the roads. We took the cover off of the frame to put it away for the winter. We stacked the tables on edge so they shed the snow. Generally, prepared the site for heavy snows and protect our improvements.

By noon we had been working 3-4 hours and hunger was upon us. We had hotdogs, chips, potato salad, cookies, and drinks. Of course we had the perfect hotdog fire to roast them on. Thanks to Micah Olivera and his girl friend who whittled out some nice long sticks to cook with. After the needed rest we were back at it. More cutting, more piling, firewood cutting, loading poles, and general cleanup. More people kept showing up. Some came for the 1st half of the day and some came for the second half of the day. A special thanks to the Lacey family for the use of their ATV, the cookies, and for bringing the whole family to help. I believe they had fun "logging" with the ATV. It did not appear they were considering it work at the time.

In the end I am very pleased with the results. 12 piles were burned, that's 6 more than average. Two people went home with firewood and one a good load of poles. A particularly nasty piece of ground with lots of dead trees has been vastly improved. There are about 5 acres of this property that looks park like today. We had no injuries outside of blisters.

As of November 7<sup>th</sup> there has been an estimated 256 hours of labor put into the Meacham property for just 2010. I can say it really shows. No money was spent by the lodge in 2010 for work or improvements at Friendship campground. It makes you proud to be a Knight to see how we come together and have fun while getting good work done. Thanks to all who have helped and or supported these activities.
