afford to wait.

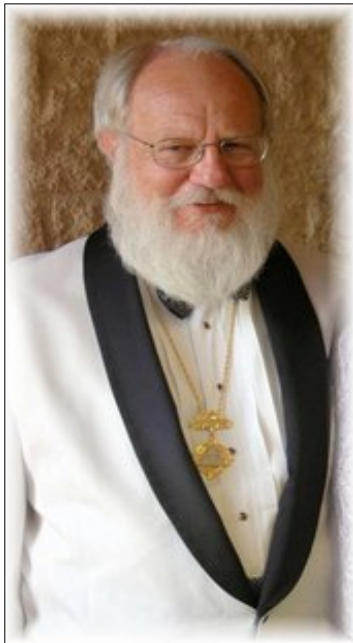

In Memory of Sir Darrell Henry, Past Supreme Chancellor



Darrell Leon Henry
Past Supreme Chancellor
June 1939 ~ October 2011

Darrell Leon Henry **"An Uncommon Man"**

Darrell Leon Henry was born June 2nd, 1939 in Portland, Oregon to parents Bertram Frank Henry and Opal Maxine Vice Henry. Darrell was the oldest of 7 siblings . 6 boys and 1 girl. As a carpenter, Darrell's father moved the family often. The Henry family started out in Portland, lived in Oklahoma for a brief time when Darrell was 4, then to Newport for over a decade, finally returning to Portland. Following Darrell's graduation from Roosevelt High School, he enrolled for college at Brigham Young University in Salt Lake City, Utah. He would have liked to complete his education, however money was tight so he left college and joined the US Army in October 1958. His military duty included working as a medic in the psychiatric wards of Fitzsimons Hospital in Denver, Colorado.

Darrell married Marilyn Harlow in 1961. They made their home in Hillsboro where they worked together to raise 3 sons: Brad, Matt and Jason. Darrell was very proud of all 3 of his sons. In 2004 Darrell moved to Beaverton. In 2008 he became divorced, then married Kathlene Lacy of Portland, Oregon.

Darrell was always industrious. At age 12, he took on a large newspaper route, riding his bike along the steep, twisty roads of Newport. After the Army, Darrell worked at US Bank and Sawyers/GAF (ViewMaster). Because of his outgoing personality and leadership style, he became a sales representative for a large fastener company. When the opportunity arose in the mid-1970's, Darrell became a co-owner of Stauffer Supply , a fastener distribution company in Portland. This was the position Darrell held the longest (approximately 25 years) and loved the most, as it allowed him to use his skills in sales and management as well as developing complex inventory control systems. He relished the year that Stauffer's hit their goal of \$1,000,000 in annual sales. Two of Darrell's sons, Brad and Jason, as well as his daughter-in-law Sheri Mathiesen and his nephew Randy Long, worked at Stauffer over the years. When Darrell's longtime partnership at Stauffer ended in 1999, Darrell moved on to public service at Washington County. He worked in the Capital Project Management Department, where he managed the contract process for road and bridge construction. Darrell retired in 2009, two days following his 70th birthday.

Darrell was always active in community service, whether to his church, the Association of Retarded Citizens, Hillsboro Kiwanis or the Pythians, he was a leader. As President of Hillsboro Kiwanis, Darrell was awarded as President of the Year for the Northwest Division (OR, WA, ID, BC) of Kiwanis International. A fellow Kiwanian, Nick Mathiesen introduced Darrell to the fraternal order Knights of Pythias, which is based on the timeless principles of Friendship, Charity and Benevolence. Darrell joined that organization in North Plains, later transferring to Hillsboro. Darrell rose through the ranks of leadership, from local chapter, through state level, then in 1994 ascending to the highest office possible: Supreme Chancellor (International President) for a 2-year term. He was an accomplished public speaker and loved teaching leadership training workshops.

One of Darrell's favorite activities was serving as Santa Claus for the Pythians. For 10 years, he donned the red velvet jacket, white trimmed hat, tall boots and bells so that he could bring cheer to children and elders in numerous hospitals, retarded citizens shelters, teen shelters, family shelters, Alzheimer's homes and the Washington County Foster Parents Association. In the month of December, Santa Darrell and a crew of Pythian elves would often share the Spirit-with more than 1,000 children and elders.

Darrell's hobbies were community service, travel, photography, reading, desktop publishing, cooking and leadership training. Darrell loved long road trips, so it wasn't unusual for him to take off for a trip in his convertible and

drive from Portland to California or Arizona just to see the sights. He especially loved travelling to areas where there were high mountains, such as to the start of the Columbia River in Revelstoke, British Columbia, to Wallowa Lake in NE Oregon, and to the Swiss Alps. In his later years, Darrell and Kathlene made trips to Hawaii, where Darrell arranged a horseback ride in the lush Waipio Valley, and to Europe, which had been a childhood dream. He especially enjoyed Rome, Venice and Switzerland.

The last year of Darrell's life was a difficult one due to health issues. He was in and out of hospitals from January through September. In mid-April Darrell was diagnosed as having had an ischemic stroke; with a 2nd larger one mid-June.

On August 1 a contrast MRI-identified the real problem as a brain tumor . not a stroke. To extend his life, Darrell began a rigorous 6.5 week course of oral chemo plus daily radiation treatments. However on September 28th, when he had only 7 treatments to go, his body failed and he was referred to Ray Hickey Hospice House in Vancouver, Washington. Darrell, as well as his family and friends who visited him there, were well cared for by the compassionate hospice staff. Earlier on and throughout all of his treatment, Darrell said over and over again how much he appreciated the professionalism and advocacy that he was receiving to each of the Kaiser Permanente staff members who cared for him.

A wall hanging on Darrell's office wall explains his view on life. The poem *My Creed* authored by Dean Alfange reads as follows: *"I do not choose to be a common man. It is my right to be uncommon – if I can. I seek opportunity – not security. I do not wish to be a kept citizen, humbled and dulled by having the state look after me. I want to take the calculated risk; to dream and to build, to fail and to succeed. I refuse to barter incentive for a dole. I prefer the challenges of life to the guaranteed existence; the thrill of fulfillment to the stale calm of utopia. I will not trade freedom for beneficence nor my dignity for a handout. It is my heritage to think and act for myself, enjoy the benefit of my creations, and to face the world boldly and say, this I have done. All this is what it means to be an American."*

In summary, Darrell was a fine man. He was charismatic, smart and had a good sense of humor. He was a true leader who had a sense of vision for the future. He was especially talented in leading groups, working on long-range programs so that everyone would have success. He was honest to a fault and would stand up for what he believed was right, even when it wasn't the popular view. Above all, he was a faithful friend and will be sorely missed.

Darrell passed away the evening of October 7, 2011 surrounded by family and friends. He is survived by his first wife Marilyn Harlow Henry, his second wife Kathlene Lacy Henry, his sons Brad Henry (Barb) of Moro, Oregon, Matt Henry of Hillsboro and Jason Henry (Sheri Mathiesen) of Hillsboro. He is survived by his siblings Marsha Henry de la Garza of Portland; Gene Henry (Linda) of Peoria, AZ; James Henry (Pam) of Redmond, OR; Joseph Henry (Catherine) of Phoenix, AZ; and Jeffrey Henry of Portland, OR. He was predeceased by his parents Bertram Frank Henry and Opal Maxine Vice Henry, as well as his brother Rodney Henry (Winonna).

A Celebration of Life event was held Saturday, November 5th at Hillsboro Pythian Hall with Steve Calaway presiding. Colin Brown offered the prayer. PSR, PIR Mark Erickson, GC Ed Yates and PGC Bill Peal presented the Knights of Pythias Memorial Service. Two members from Aloha American Legion Post presented the American flag and played Taps. Hillsboro Pythians assisted the Henry family with hosting a luncheon following the formal ceremonies.

Speaking Historically — by Mark Erickson



Mark Erickson

As Grand Historian of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, it is my duty, at times, to remind the members of the conditions when the lodges in Oregon were being instituted.

At the time of the institution of the Grand Lodge in 1881, these were the conditions for travel in Oregon. Those who now reap the advantage of the labors know little of what it meant in those days to work up and institute lodges in a country that had not a single railroad save the apology for one that ran on the sand hill alongside the upper part of the Columbia River. For instance: To reach Baker City from the Central Pacific Railroad on the South meant a journey 450 miles by stage .

from Portland meant 300 miles by river, and then 190 miles over the Blue Mountains, by stage. Those who instituted these lodges made both journeys and can speak feelingly. The names of the men who blazed the Pythian way through Oregon in those days should ever be held in grateful remembrances, and if, in one or two instances, they failed to measure up to the full standard, their services should earn for their shortcomings the mantle of Charity. We knew them all, the strong as well as the weak . the latter have long since gone to their eternal rest . peace to their ashes, and may the recollections of those better days and kindly deed, be to others, as to us, the only place on memory's page that bears their names.

Lodges instituted before the Grand Lodge were:

Excelsior Lodge, No. 1 in Portland, Oregon, on January 26, 1873, through the efforts of Louis Lachman and Charles Tichenor of San Francisco.

Mystic Lodge, No. 2 in Portland, Oregon, on September 16, 1873, through the efforts of Ward S. Stevens and George F. Grant who withdrew from Excelsior No. 1 for the purpose of organizing Mystic No. 2.

Myrtle Lodge, No. 3 in Marshfield, Oregon, on September 27, 1875, through the efforts of Alexander Campbell and William Dunbar. Marshfield, Oregon is now Coos Bay.

Damon Lodge, No. 4 in Pendleton, Oregon, on April 28, 1876, through the efforts of J.H. Turner and Israel C. Disoway.

McLaughlin Lodge, No. 5 in Oregon City, Oregon, on December 8, 1876, through the efforts of George A. Harding and J. B. David. McLaughlin Lodge surrendered its charter on October 4, 1878.

Astor Lodge, No. 6 in Astoria, Oregon, on January 24, 1877, through the efforts of Brothers O.F. Bell and Theodore Broemser and E.D. Curtis.

Laurel Lodge, No. 7 in Albany, Oregon, on May 30, 1879, through the efforts of George M. Champlain and George W. Hochstedler.

Gauntlet Lodge, No. 8 in Baker City, Oregon, on August 1, 1881, through the efforts of William D. Kennedy, PSR of Chicago and T.C. Hyde.

Friendship Lodge, No. 9 in The Dalles, Oregon, on September 24, 1881, through the efforts of Brothers J.C. Neitz, S.E. Yancy and E.S. Larsen.

Oregon Grand Convention ~ at the Beach in Newport

Oregon Pythians and members from several other states convened in Newport the 3rd weekend in October for our State Pythian Convention. Grand Chancellor Bill Peal and Grand Chief Maureen Murphy presided over the Knights and Sisters sessions. Meetings went smoothly and everyone took advantage of breaks to enjoy some time on the beach.

The weekend began with hospitality hosted by Damon Lodge of Pendleton. Next came Friday's joint Representatives Banquet where the members enjoyed good food and fellowship.

Saturday morning our meetings convened. We had a joint luncheon where the Grand Temple Officers continued their tradition of presenting a gift to the Grand Chief. Following lunch, the meetings began again.

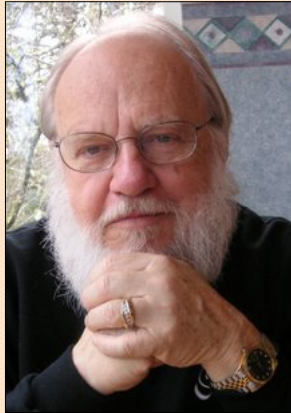

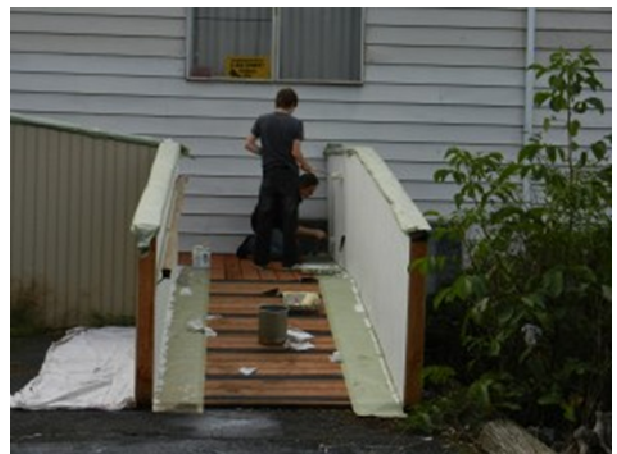

Roseburg, Thermopylae and Talisman had joint meetings once each month in rotating fashion with a dinner prior to the meeting. We also made a point of visitations to Bend, Salem, Astoria and many other Lodges and Temples. Talisman had just completed our fourth community project. In 1963 we located a building to house the deaf school established by the Junior League. The Veterans Administration was abandoning an old schoolhouse which they sold

to us for \$1.00. We then refurbished it and brought in play equipment to create a playground for the children. In 1964 we refurbished a Medco logging locomotive as playground equipment in a local park. In 1965 we restored the roof of McKee Covered Bridge on the Applegate River just outside Jacksonville and in 1966 we built a dressing room/restrooms at another park in Medford.

Rip created the travelling trophy and presented it to the Talisman/Thermopylae dinner in the fall of 1966.

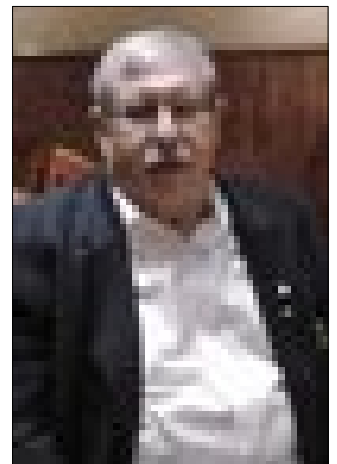


Talbot, MEC of Helmetta Temple #29, took Sam downtown and gave him a tour of our Pythian Building.
