



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
News From Pendleton ~ Damon Lodge On a Roll ~ By Scott Hancock

A Few Cookbooks Still Available

When we ordered the cookbooks, we ordered 300 and since they do a 10 percent overrun to allow for any problems during printing and binding, we actually received 330 cookbooks, plus 11 free cookbooks to offset the cost of the shipping. Out of the 341 received, we donated a few to Supreme Temple for their Craft Room and to date, with the help of all the Sisters and many of the Brothers, 263 cookbooks have been sold.

After paying the bill from Morris Press for the printing of the cookbooks, which was \$950, there has been \$1,600 turned in to Grand Secretary Shelley Corby.

This sounds really great, but, we do still have about 75 cookbooks left, and available for sale. Most of these are at Irene Clinks home in Cornelius, so they will be more easily available to anyone wanting more to sell. Everyone has done a great job of selling, but if we all try just a little more, we can sell the last of the cookbooks and add another \$750.00 to what has already been turned in.



This meeting is an annual meeting where the citizen's desires are discussed for the future of Hillsboro. At this meeting, progress on the Hillsboro 2020 Vision plan was discussed with the community.

The lodge hall located next to the new City Civic center was made available for childcare during the meeting. This was a great success with 30 children participating in the many activities offered at the Hall including art and crafts, Lego construction and indoor volleyball.

This contribution by the Hillsboro Pythians assisted the City present a very successful evening sharing the Hillsboro 2020 Vision plan with the Community. For the Hillsboro Pythians this was just another example where they have worked to serve the Community in which we live.

It is taking me time to decompress and to unpack the density of experiences that I experienced in Jordan and Israel as part of my training to be a Lutheran pastor. It was, so to speak, a "history crash" where modern mores collided with historic prejudices, where cities of steel and electronics are built over cities of stone and mud and where angry claims of the past are gouged into the flesh of modern children by rocks and bullets.

I did reflect on the irony on being a Knight in travel in the Holy Lands carrying a message of brotherhood and peace between all peoples. I carried the goodwill of Hermes Lodge 56 with me as I traveled into these very different worlds.

The fast pace through scenes of biblical history, layer upon layer, provided a kaleidoscope of sensory images. Wherever we would go, I would caress the surfaces of the stones, knowing that my touch would blend with the touch of hundreds of thousands who had gone before. The incarnate nature of this experience was deep and penetrating.

I had prepared for my journey by reading our recommended books - finding the most hopeful to be the "Tent of Abraham" the compendium by Joan Chittister, Murshid Saadi Shakur Chisti and Rabbi Arthur Waskow which looked to the patriarch's legacy as a foundation of unity between the three faiths. Hopeful that is, until I understood that the conflict in the Middle East appears to be much more venial than that, more about money, power and land ownership -the base elements - than differences of view. The religions get along quite well it appears.

Our journey had two levels, the first took us back into time contemplating the pulse beat of different civilizations moving across the holy land, the second part plunged us into the cauldron of modern suffering in the Middle East. I found that a veneer of modern civilization in Israel covered a brutality that seemed straight out of 1930s Germany even though we visited the Holocaust memorial Yad Vashem and saw how deeply the memory of this horror was cut into Jewish culture. This modern, similar world of land seizures, internal passports, instant executions and disrespect was based on a philosophy of exclusive divine right to one group of people. The chosen people- who, through some fantastic denial and anesthesia of conscience, - was somehow revisiting this curse on others.

The other group of people, the Palestinians, a mix of Christian and Moslem origins, was constrained in their freedom to the point of hunger and death. I found by far that my experience of oppression of the Palestinian peoples moved me deeply and profoundly. Their suffering, interminable and deep, scarred me and disturbed me - so much so that I know I will be involved and will go back. I noticed with deep concern the unease experienced by Naim, our Palestinian guide when we traversed places Hebron, where visited the Christian Peacemakers - and stood between soldiers settlers, and when visited Augustus-Victoria the hospital when we had to move though cordons of soldiers who had power of travel permission, and also, obviously life or death. What a relief it was to hold

an American passport here. Israel was a staccato experience for me, of tension, relief, tension, and relief as we moved from checkpoint to checkpoint. Israel was not peaceful at all. It felt, on almost every level, unholy - as if somehow the divine had moved away in disgust at what was going on - as if this filtering and exclusion had filtered out the most high.

The wall that had been constructed across the Palestinian homeland was dividing the soul of the Palestinian as well as the Israeli people. Its construction was being used to take valuable agricultural land from the Palestinians and resulted in the essential imprisonment and exile of the Palestinians from their homes, their families and schools.

It appeared in may ways, that the oppression was energized by a core group of ultra-orthodox fanatics (with American roots) driving a process of invasive settlement in Palestinian heartland areas by home confiscation and demolition. Along with the influence of Christian Zionists, as outlined in Gorenberg's book, "The End of Days" this effort seemed designed to accelerate a process of disintegration. We were lucky to find this core of dementia somewhat counteracted by groups such as B'Tselem, Rabbis for Human Rights, Sabeel and the Israeli Committee Against House Demolitions who act as representatives of the conscience of Israel and Palestine.

We had flown from Chicago, to Paris, to Jordan first. Our guide in Jordan was Mohammed, a middle-age man. He was a devout Muslim and shared with us, quietly, his stories of faith. Our first hotel in Jordan was the Star Hotel, its entrance at the top of a hill. After orange juice and a meal



I happily retired to my single room to isolate myself from the world of new forces that impinged upon me. I went to sleep quickly after watching some Jordanian television, AlJazeera with a Signal toothpaste advertisement. I woke quickly at 4.40 am with the call of the muezzin haunting my room. It was an otherworldly, haunting sound, suggesting that the divine had crept front and center of things. It sent a frisson of strangeness down my spine.

I rose quickly with the sound, not praying exactly but reflecting on how God had brought me to this place. I nursed my shower into providing a trickle of water for my purposes. Water was much of a theme as I would later discover. After breakfast, we began the first of our fast journeys. (Mitri Raheb, the Lutherna pastor, who we would meet later in Bethlehem, would call this rapid dash into history, "Running where Jesus had walked").

Our first visit was to Madaba, a town with a history from the Neolithic times, where, in the Madaba Church, we saw a map mosaic from the 6th century that laid out in correct sequence the bible lands; including the Sinai, Israel, Palestine and Jerusalem. We photographed this map extensively. Afterwards we made the ascent to Mount Nebo, where Moses first witnessed the Promised Land. We left the rocky landscape behind us and saw, through the mist, the sweep of verdure reminiscent of my home state of Oregon. Here, at the top, was a church maintained by the Franciscans, who we would find, seemed to have a proprietary interest over many of the holy sites in the Middle East. Here there was a clever sculpture combining the Tau Cross with the snake that Moses lifted high on a pole as an antidote to those bitten by poisonous snakes, that eerily foreshadowed the cross and that emerges in modern symbolism as the staff of Asclepius in medicine.

After Jordan we came to the site of John the Baptist, Bethany beyond the Jordan, said to be the authentic site where Jesus was baptized. It inhabited a weird desert environment, complete with wind-carved turrets and ledges. It felt like the ground that the Holy Spirit played in. Here I felt quiet, at home in a strange way - and as we made our way to the Jordan river, I felt excited, much more so than anything else I had felt. Close to the border with Israel I noticed the barbed-wire fences that cordoned off land that once had been seeded with land-mines - a relic from the six-day war. I thought that Jesus would have loved to be here, before the land-mines, here where John had made this eerie solitude a place of purity, a gateway to the promise of the kingdom. How could you not be among these odd spires and natural carvings and not feel close to the maker of things? We came to a dried-up spring and mosaics, thought to be where John performed his rite with "living

water" from the spring. A few yards away were steps down to the Jordan River, where I fished a liter bottle of river water upon the explicit instructions of my pastor. A Jordanian soldier guarded watch, rifle pointed down but ready

We visited Petra the next day, travelling from our next hotel, the "Candles" hotel just a hop away from the canyon, Wadi Musa, that led to the lost city. Petra was the city featured in "Raiders of the Lost Ark". Petra, the capital of the Nabateans was a natural vehicle of water collection used by the Nabateans to harvest the gushing floods of the fifty day rains that regularly drench Jordan. The majesty of this rock-hewn city was extraordinary.

I became detached from our group here, wandering to a restaurant in a cave that I found later was the wrong caveto wait for the others. I stayed drinking ubiquitous Nescafe with the owner, Ali, and talked about his life and thoughts. I was invited the next time I visit to stay with him out in the desert and sleep under the stars. He was, he said, a descendant of the Nabateans and this was his life. The Nabateans use to navigate using the stars, he said. The Nabateans were dealers in frankincense and myrrh, desert spices, and made trade routes between the oases of the desert and hidden sources of water. Ali said to me that if the Palestinian issue was solved, all the struggle in neighboring Iraq would cease.

After Petra, the next day, we visited Jerash, the Decapolis city. I had developed a presentation describing the architecture and significance of this majestic city as part of my class work.

I thought of how these non-human scale buildings must have rankled with Jesus, with the apparent licentiousness and alien eros of this new culture. How much in contrast to the stark beauty of the desert this must have been. Seeing these marauding and gigantic cultures crash into the little world of the Galilee must have been an awful thing to see.

After Jerash we traversed the border to Nazareth, taking on our new guide, Naim, an old friend of the Professors'. In Nazareth, a chilly and not well-kept inn welcomed us. We visited Mary's well and the Church of the Annunciation, where I wept for no good reason at all.

We then visited Caesarea, driving through Haifa, (an Israeli version of Seattle, complete with Microsoft), on the coast. Its Roman aqueduct still looming over the oceanfront. After this we raced to Megiddo, where its ominous reputation as a place where the end of the world would be invented (Armageddon) was displaced by its pastoral charm. I took a few moments to baptize the mountain Megiddo with a new

name, Salem, place of peace - after our capital city in Oregon and prayed for the peace of all mankind. I did this with some of the river water from the Jordan river. In this way we cancelled Armageddon and thus brought about the end of the end of the world. You may now carry on as usual.

In Ibillin, we visited Archbishop Eliad Chacour, at the Peace Center of the Mar Elias Educational School where he delivered a numbing tongue-lashing to us in our roles as Americans for our actions in Iraq that he said was discrediting us all over the Middle East. "Oil" he said - all this was about oil.

At the Ein-Gev kibbutz I sat on the shores of the Sea of Galilee and experienced the lapping of the waves and the serenity of the water at sunset. It was, as Jesus must have experienced it, natural, simple, gentle, unencumbered by trappings of imperialism. I could imagine him walking on the water here.

Bethlehem was a shock, it had a giant wall and guard-towers built around it. It was a prison city. Our entry into Bethlehem felt as if we were entering a jail and we were inmates. The wall had crushed much of the life from the city. Inside we met dapper ELCA Pastor Mitri Raheb, author of "I am a Palestinian Christian" who says in his book, "I am a Palestinian

living under Israeli occupation. My captor daily seeks to make life harder from me. He encircles my people with barbed wire; he builds walls around us, and his army sets many boundaries around us. He succeeds in keeping thousands of us in camps and prisons... Yet despite all these efforts, he has not succeeded in taking my dreams from me." Mitri is known and loved by all the people, both Moslem and Christian, that I came to speak with in Bethlehem. His non-violent openness and faithfulness was inspiration to me.

In my journey I visited many places and talked to may people. I wandered freely and without fear in the Arab quarters of the west bank towns. The Americans are seen as kind and generous people by the Arabs who will one day help them too.

I also went to the wailing wall and shared in the prayers of 10,000 orthodox Jews on a Sabbath eve - and felt the waves of divine love wash over the crowd like a tidal wave.

I took over 1,000 pictures and recorded 150 sound files. Some of these I am soon posting on my website $\underline{\text{www.pastorblaster.}}$ $\underline{\text{com}}$ where you may view them. I would also be happy to come and give a slide show to our brothers and sisters at any time.



Independence Day ~ Take a Moment to Reflect!

Drafted by Thomas Jefferson between June 11 and June 28, 1776, the Declaration of Independence is at once the nation's most cherished symbol of liberty and Jefferson's most enduring monument. Here, in exalted and unforgettable phrases, Jefferson expressed the convictions in the minds and hearts of the American people. The political philosophy of the Declaration was not new; its ideals of individual liberty had already been expressed by John Locke and the Continental philosophers. What Jefferson did was to summarize this philosophy in "self-evident truths" and set forth a list of grievances against the King in order to justify before the world the breaking of ties between the colonies and the mother country.

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they

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
